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Dear Students and Parents, It is a pleasure to be your instructor for this important examination of government and how it has been for democracies to survive despite challenges.

Civics examines the purposes, principles, and practices of American government as established by the Constitution. Students are expected to understand their rights and responsibilities as citizens and how to exercise these rights and responsibilities in local, state, and national government. Students will learn the structure and processes of the government of the state of Florida and various local governments as well as understanding other forms of government around the world.

Students will review the concept of ethics within society and how they relate to government. They will study governmental philosophies from the Greeks and the Enlightenment thinkers of the 16th and 17th centuries and how these ideas influenced the Founding Fathers. Students will consider what values are important to them and how should their representatives reflect these values within



Primary source documents are a key feature of United States Government and Civics standards. As this is an advanced course many readings will be above 7th grade level but limited in size and scope. It is expected for students to use dictionary.com or other sources to enhance their understanding.

Skills Assessment In this course, we will be covering topics pertaining to US history its government and how democracy works. You will be tested over each of these topics throughout the course. Testing, or formal summative assessments, may include unit tests, vocabulary quizzes, or very short writing assignments. Informal assessments such as being prepared for class lectures and discussions through class participation are also important. Be prepared before each lecture.

End of Year Exam (EOC) will be given to all 7th graders in early May. This exam will count for approximately 33% of your grade for the year.

Getting a top score of 5 has the consequence of raising GPA one grade but getting a score of 1 or 2 will lower GPA up to 1 letter grade. Any student with a D average for the year will fail the course. As you can see from the benchmarks listed there is an enormous amount of information and concepts students must master. Therefore, every assignment, every benchmark must be taken seriously from the beginning. There is far too much to cram it in during the last week or two.

Notes must be typed or downloaded onto students NOTES Folder in 365 OneNote. Notes will be selectively graded. Students can upload hand written notes.

**TABLE OF CONTENT** - The first 2 pages on each folder will be a table of content (just like your text book). The title of each lecture/reading notes test, assignment will appear on the student folder table of content with the page # directly to the left.

In this way the students will be able to search their notes to prepare for exams and open note quizzes. Look for the title on the table of content, note the page #, go to the page then look to the column on the left for Concepts/Key ideas to go to the exact concept you need to study.



Richie Sexson was a first baseman for the Seattle Mariners, earning \$50 million over four years. In 2007, he hit barely .200 for the season and struck out more times than all but a handful of players. It's possible that never in the history of the game had so much been paid for so little production.

At first, fans didn't seem to care what Richie was getting, so long as he swatted enough homers among his strikeouts. But during his freefall, that \$8 hot dog and \$10 beer did not go down so easily. He was booed out of the game in ever-polite Seattle. As it turns out, there's a performance clause in class resentment.

And when home-office hobbyists could flip a tract house every six months and walk away with a sweat-free windfall, no one would have minded if, say, Countrywide Financial was paying exotic dancers to sort the M&Ms on board the corporate jet of its chief executive officer, Angelo Mozilo. But after Countrywide collapsed, and more than 12,000 people lost their jobs and many more lost their life savings, Mozilo was a pariah. How could be stand to make \$110 million in total severance (later reduced) after driving the nation's largest home lender into the ground?
